

But some sure felt the love ... five Arrowmen renewed their memberships during the Winter Banquet!










Letter from the Chief

2021 Dues Now Accepted

When did you pay your annual dues in the past? Many do so at the Winter Banquet (13% in '19), some at Fall Fellowship or Summer Camp (19% each). But the majority do so at the Spring Fellowship (34%). Seems like the first major in-person event is the typical "light bulb" moment.

But you can take care of this task right now (see other story for Golden Kernel info)!

Online payment (and paper forms) are on the lodge website, www.wq23.org. If you prefer paper (and many still do, so it's perfectly fine), deliver paper forms to the Service Center in Peoria or Bloomington.

Call ahead for hours.

Why pay dues?

- Dues keep our lodge <u>financially strong</u>. The money you pay goes toward many things, including annual recharter fees, inductions, service projects, communication and more.
- Your dues payment keeps you as <u>an active member</u> of the Lodge, which means you can stay involved in all of the opportunities for OA brotherhood, cheerfulness, and service.
- Only dues-paid members will receive emailed/mailed newsletters and other information. Renew soon, or this may be your last newsletter!
- You must be a dues-paid member to attend OA events throughout the year, like the Spring and Fall Fellowships, Winter Banquet, OA High Adventurer, Section events, OA training and NOAC.
- Remember, you MUST be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America to be in the OA.

How to Prepare for Unit Elections

The season for OA Elections is coming to each and every unit. Is yours ready?

Don't worry if your answer is, "Not really." That's where most units are. But you can take steps to ... be prepared.

Elections will run very much as they did last year, when 23 of the 41 elections used the online election form that was new in 2020. The form submitted results faster, aided legibility and saved trees in the process!

To start, everyone should view the five-minute national video on You Tube (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4Rgtzffgvlg&t=10s). It starts with "general OA info"

that is good for all to know and remember Then, it goes into detailed descriptions of how individual unit elections work.



Then, go to our lodge site (www.wq23.org) to see the video lodge leaders created on our specific process, and fill out an online form to request your election (live Feb. 8).

From Lost to Leader: WQ23's Terry Hendriex Named Central Region Chief

We asked newly minted Central Regional Chief, Terry Hendriex (from Troop 1142 in Clinton), to explain his "if it weren't for ..." moment that motivated him to stay active in the OA.

"Immediately following my induction, I remember being tired and hungry, but most of all confused. I wasn't sure what to make of the OA and I felt lost because there was no one outside my troop I knew well.

"I stayed involved though, because people like Paul Oelkers immediately turned that around and made the Order of the Arrow feel like a family to me. He quickly encouraged me to get involved, wanted me to succeed, and introduced me to new friends I would've never met. I think it's easy to go through your induction and then not feel included into the OA. If it weren't for him reaching out encouraging me to stay, I would've never known this organization like I do today.

New Ceremony Regalia Is On the Way

The lodge is working toward a change in ceremonial regalia, in accord with national OA policies. Lodges pursuing such attire should make efforts to depict tribes indigenous to their areas.

The Sac and Fox tribes lived in Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, and Nebraska. One of their largest villages was Saukenuk, between the Rock and Mississippi Rivers



in Illinois, with approximately 4,000 Sac and Fox people.

Our ceremonies team worked with the McLean County Museum of History to research these tribes' apparel, and are busy creating the regalia seen here, pictured alongside historical photos of actual Sac / Fox tribe members as a pattern reference.

Not as flashy as those seen in Western movies? That's the point.

The BSA is trying to support and embrace the people who actually walked our trails and fished our rivers, rather than perpetuate Hollywood stereotypes.

The current plan is to debut the new regalia at our 2021 Spring Fellowship.


